1. Their predicament was unexpected (v. 37)

2. Their predicament was unprecedented (v. 37)

B. The Disciples' Perplexity: Jesus asleep amidst the storm.

1. Their perplexity was due to the Master's seeming indifference. (v. 38)

2. Their perplexity was due to the Master's seeming inaction. (v. 38)

3. Their perplexity led to the disciples' desperation. (v. 38)

C. The Master's Power: He rebuked the wind. (v. 39)

1. The demonstration of the Master's power is distinct. (v. 41)

2. The implication of the Master's power is unique. (v. 41)

a. The Master's power goes beyond His humanity. (v. 41)

b. The Master's power attests His divinity.

(v. 41; Phil. 2:5-11; Ps. 107:28-29; Ps. 65:7)

Conclusion:

Read Mark 4: 35 – 41 and Luke 8:24.
