- 3. For Strength (1 Peter 4:11)

D. Originates from our relationship with the Divine Person of Jesus

Christ

- 1. "In His mercy, He (God) has given us <u>new birth into a living hope</u> through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead" (1 Pet. 1:3)
- 2. Mercy made available (1 Peter 2:10)
