A. JESUS DEMONSTRATED HIGH GRACE

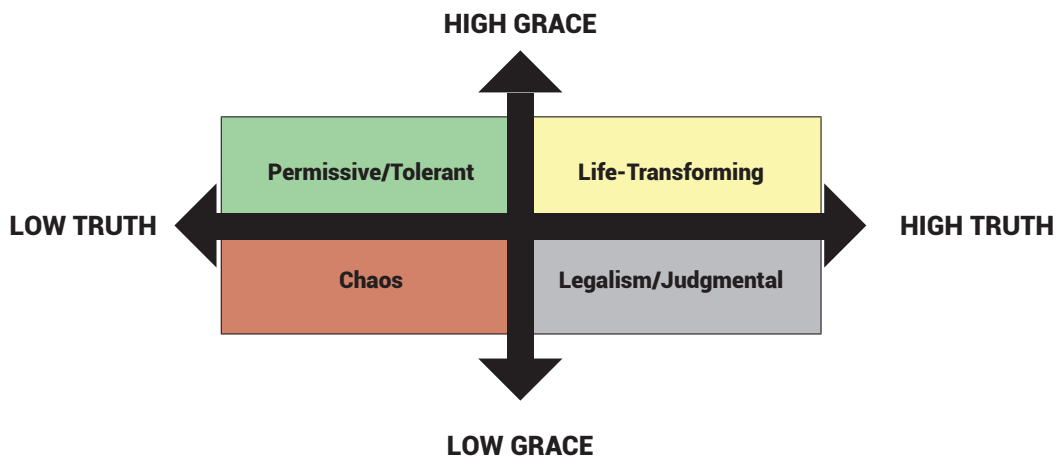
1. Jesus is no stranger to **controversy** (v. 1-4)

TABLETALK QUESTIONS

1. Read John 8:1-11. How does this passage prepare us as Christians to address the different kinds of people who come to the church?
2. What is odd about their accusation in John 8:4 against this woman caught in adultery?
3. What Old Testament law are the scribes and Pharisees referring to in John 8:5 (see Deuteronomy 22:22)? Why did they all of a sudden want Jesus' opinion?
4. What did they think were His choices? How did Jesus repel their trap?
5. Although the narrative did not mention what Jesus wrote, what did He mostly write that stopped the accusers of pursuing their plan?
6. Why did Jesus raise "Himself up" (John 8:7)? Why did He then stoop down "again" (John 8:8)?
7. Who left first after hearing, "He who is without sin among you, let him throw a stone at her first" (John 8:7)? Why?
8. Did Jesus address the woman' adultery? How and what could have been the likely outcome?
9. As Christians, how do we apply the principle of High Truth and High Grace towards people?
