Types of “absence” in family relationship:

1. **Physical** absence (1 Sam. 27:1-8; 28:1-2)
2. **Relational** absence (1 Sam. 27:1-8; 28:1-2)
3. Physical **presence** but relationally **absent**

Actions David took to recover his family:

1. **Decision** - David decided to be present to his family (1 Sam. 29:11; 30:1)
2. **Realization** - David had a full understanding of what happened (1 Sam. 30:1-4)
3. **Contrition** - David responded humbly to what happened (1 Sam. 30:3-5)
4. **Consultation** - David ‘inquired of the Lord’ (1 Sam. 30:7-8)
5. **Determination** - David pursued the enemy relentlessly (1 Sam. 30:9-17)
