A. THE DECISION THAT BECAME A DISAPPOINTMENT

- 1. Abraham decided on a **redirection** (12:8-10)
- 2. Abraham took a significant <u>risk</u> (12:11-16)
- 3. Abraham became **remorseful** (12:17-13:3)

B. THE DECISION THAT BECAME A **DISASTER**

- 1. Lot was **selfish** (13:8-11)
- 2. Lot wanted a **shortcut** (13:11-12)
- 3. Lot was **shortsighted** (13:13; 19:23-28;13:14-16)

How to safeguard your decisions:

- 1. Always look beyond the positive benefits of a decision.
- 2. **Never** underestimate the impact of negative consequences.
- 3. **Forget** about pleasing only yourself.
- 4. **Remember** with greater independence and freedom, there is a greater need for guidance, wisdom and accountability.

LIFE GROUP QUESTIONS

- 1. Icebreaker: What major decision did you make last year? How did it turn out?
- 2. Abraham's obedience to God was admirable by leaving his country and his people to the great unknown. But when He finally arrived in Canaan, it was unexpected. Read Genesis 12:8-10 and share your reflections about Abraham's change of direction.
 - Have you followed God's direction only to find out that there were more obstructions along the way? How did you respond?
 - Do you trust that God would see you through a plan, or do you decide that maybe
 —since you were facing adversity—this wasn't the path or place where God
 wanted you, and so you changed direction?
- 3. Abraham continued with his redirection and made matters worse. Read Genesis 12:11-16.
 - How did Abraham's plan to lie about Sarah being his sister backfired?
 - Would this decision have a lasting impact on their relationship as husband and wife?
- 4. Abraham was remorseful of his poor decisions while in Egypt, and he returned to Canaan and built an altar to recommit his faith to God. But a conflict between Abraham and Lot was brewing, and they needed to part ways. Read Genesis 13:8-12.
 - How do you compare Abraham and Lot's characters and the decision-making paradigms they represent?
 - Abraham gave Lot the right to decide how they would divide the land despite being the rightful decision-maker, an elder, and a surrogate father. Was this a result of Abraham's previous experience in Egypt or his intuitive nature?
 - Do age and experience play an essential role when making significant life decisions? When is the right time to ask counsel from someone in making decisions for our lives?

- 5. Read Genesis 13:13 and Genesis 19:23-28. In what ways did Lot's poor decision lead to a disaster and the demise of his own family?
- 6. Last Sunday's message concluded with the following principles for safeguarding our decision. What principle in your life do you need to work on?
 - <u>Always</u> look beyond the positive benefits of a decision.
 - Never underestimate the impact of negative consequences.
 - Forget about pleasing only yourself.
 - <u>Remember</u> with greater independence and freedom, there is a more significant need for guidance, wisdom and accountability.
